# Bay'ah

**Bay 'ah** (<u>Arabic</u>: بَيْعَة, "Pledge of allegiance"), in <u>Islamic terminology</u>, is an <u>oath of allegiance</u> to a leader. It is known to have been practiced by the <u>Islamic prophet Muhammad</u>. *Bay 'ah* is sometimes taken under a written pact given on behalf of the subjects by leading members of the tribe with the understanding that as long as the leader abides by certain requirements towards his people, they are to maintain their allegiance to him. *Bay 'ah* is still practiced in countries such as <u>Saudi Arabia</u> and <u>Sudan</u>.<sup>[1]</sup> In <u>Morocco</u>, *bay 'ah* is one of the foundations of the monarchy.

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## In Islamic history

The tradition of *bay ah* can be traced back to the era of Muhammad. From the beginning bay *ah* was taken by Muhammad as an oath of allegiance. Anybody who wanted to join the Islamic community did so by reciting the basic statement of the faith expressing his faith in the oneness of God and the prophethood of Muhammad. However, this differed from the proclamation of faith necessary to simply become a Muslim. In addition to this the prophet formally took bay *ah* from the people and tribes. Through this formal act they entered the <u>Islamic community</u> and showed their willingness to follow and obey Muhammad. The wordings of the oath differ in different traditions but it contains the <u>shahada</u> and prayers of repentance.

It is reported that at the occasion of annual gatherings outside <u>Mecca</u>, Muhammad met people from Yathrib, later to be renamed <u>Medina</u>, who accepted his call towards Islam. Muhammad then took *bay ah* from them.<sup>[2]</sup>

# In the Qur'an

After the <u>Pledge of the Tree</u>, which led to the <u>Treaty of Hudaybiyyah</u>, the following was revealed in the <u>Qur'an</u> commemorating and appreciating the pledge and those who made it:

Certainly <u>Allah</u> was well pleased with the believers when they swore allegiance to you under the tree, and He knew what was in their hearts, so He sent down tranquillity on them and rewarded them with a near victory, — <u>Sura Al-Fath, Ayah</u> 18, <u>Quran</u> 48:18 (http://w ww.perseus.tufts.edu/hopper/text?doc=Perseus% 3Atext%3A2002.02.0003%3Asura%3D48%3Av erse%3D18) (<u>Translated</u> by <u>Shakir</u>)

#### History

The *bay'ah* of Rizwan, a collective initiation of thousands of Muslims at the hand of Muhammad, is mentioned in the Qur'an. The tradition was continued by the <u>caliphs</u>.

In subsequent ages, it was associated with <u>Sufi</u> orders, and spiritual masters would initiate their followers. The practice still exists in Sufi orders around the world.

# Content of the bay'ah

The Bayah usually consists of a relatively standardised formulation such as the following:

I give my allegiance to .... to hear and obey in times of difficulty and comfort, in hardship and ease, and to endure being discriminated against, and not to dispute about rule with those in power, except in case of evident infidelity regarding that which there is a proof from Allah,"
