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## Ancient Greek

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### Etymology

From [λόγος](#) (*lógos*, “explanation”) + [-ία](#) (-íā, abstract noun suffix).

### Pronunciation

- (*1<sup>st</sup> CE Egyptian*) IPA<sup>(key)</sup>: /lo'gi.a/
- (*4<sup>th</sup> CE Koine*) IPA<sup>(key)</sup>: /lo'χi.a/
- (*10<sup>th</sup> CE Byzantine*) IPA<sup>(key)</sup>: /lo'ji.a/
- (*15<sup>th</sup> CE Constantinopolitan*) IPA<sup>(key)</sup>: /lo'ji.a/

### Suffix

**-λογία** • (-logíā) *f* (genitive [-λογίας](#)); *first declension*

1. Base for nouns denoting the study of something, or the branch of knowledge of a discipline.

## Etymology

From Ancient Greek λέγω (*légō*, “speak, pick, tell”) (thus, “the character or department of one who speaks or treats of (a certain subject)”; see *lecture*).

## Suffix

-λογία • (-logía) *f*
